Foreword


Firstly, I want to wish you a very Happy New Year if I haven't already! And welcome to this January 2026 edition of the Daisy Chain!



Work placement reflections

We were very pleased to host a work placement student from September to December 2025. Charley, who is in the second year of her Level 3 course in Health and Social Care at Exeter College, worked on our very first **work placement live project**.

This is a project that aligns with something that we are working on. Work placement students, if they wish to, can then work on something that meets the brief, and will potentially end up in the public domain.

We've been working on our new **Bereavement & grief hub** on our website (teignangels.co.uk/bereavement), which aims to provide support to loved ones after a person they know has died; as well as, in some case, before they've died.

As part of this, Charley independently researched three types of grief: ambiguous loss; anticipatory grief, and; disenfranchised grief. She then put her research into action to create a leaflet on each. These leaflets are available to download on our website.

When we spoke with Charley about her experience on placement with us, she told us that the live project felt like her time with us was really worthwhile. It wasn't just something to keep her busy; it was a real-world project that is now available to the public. She said it felt good that it has a real purpose.

'I've definitely got something out of my placement with Teign Angels. I've learned so much being here', she told us. It's been a pleasure to host Charley, and we look forward to hearing how she does in the rest of her course, and going forward.

Charley aspires to work in forensic psychology in the future. After her course finishes in Summer 2026, she hopes to go off to university and study, to put her in the right lane for this career ambition.



Whilst we're sad Charley's placement is over, we're looking forward to 2026, when we'll be hosting more work placement students (more details coming soon!)

And we're currently working on projects for them to be a part of, if they wish to!

Daisy Chain changes



We love putting *The Daisy Chain* together. However, it is very much a labour of love, and is often subject to a lot of delays.

Celebration of strengths-based approaches

On 2nd December, the **Community Services Co-production/Co-design Group** (of which Joseph, our Office Manager, has been a part of since it started in 2023) hosted an event at County Hall.

The event was to showcase strengths-based ways of working, and looking at how they can help to shape the future of care commissioning in Devon.

Strengths-based working means to look at what a person is able to do, and might be able to with a bit of support; rather than focused on what the person cannot do, by default.

Joseph said: 'It was a really interesting day, with lots of care providers in the room. I supported some workshops looking at dementia support and services across the county, and it led to some really interesting discussions.

'For example, we talked about public messaging on dementias, and whether there was scope for it to be improved in order to reinforce the message that it is possible to live well with a dementia.

'Another discussion we had was about public awareness of dementias. One care provider commented that many people seem to think of Alzheimer's disease when they hear the word "dementia". To be fair, this is likely because Alzheimer's accounts for between 65% and 75% of all dementias worldwide. But there are many different types of dementias, each with its own causes, and its own symptoms.

'By raising awareness of some of the other types of dementias, it might lead to more people getting diagnosed early on and accessing support from day one.

'It was a really great event, and I'm looking forward to sitting down with my colleagues in the Co-production group in the New Year to dissect what came out of the conversations we had on that day.'

Congratulations, Dawn!

We'd like to say a huge congratulations to Dawn, who has passed her exam and is now a qualified **Foot Healthcare Practitioner (FHP)**. This means that Dawn is now able to provide some basic treatments for foot problems, like corns and verrucas, and cut toenails too.

Dawn started her course in late 2022, and as the final step of the course, she spent two weeks in Birmingham, doing clinic-based practice and taking her exam.



We've been attending more learning from hospices both locally and internationally over the past few months! We're so lucky to have Rowcroft Hospice on our doorstep, and their caring ethos flows through to their Education team.

'We've made great use of Rowcroft Education over the past few years. They've provided us with a lot of information, insight, guidance, and skills, and we look forward to attending some of their future events' says Joseph, our Office Manager.

'Dawn and Sophia are booked in to attend a face-to-face session at Rowcroft Hospice soon, to look at supporting people living with advanced Parkinson's at the end of their life – this is a session that Sophia and Joseph attended a few years ago, so when we saw it was running again, we jumped at the chance!'

'Sophia is currently developing in-house training specifically on supporting people living with Parkinson's disease, to bring together information which is peppered across the rest of our training. So we hope this upcoming session at Rowcroft Hospice will be invaluable!'.

'We've also recently attended some online sessions from HopeHealth Hospice, which provides hospice care to people living in the states of Rhode Island and Massachusetts. It's been really interesting to see how they do things across the pond; there are lots of similarities and differences! The insights are very useful!'

Sessions we've attended recently



Digital legacy planning

(26th November, Rowcroft Hospice)

This session looked at the intricacies and hurdles of planning our digital legacies (such as our social media, online bank accounts, game profiles, online films etc). It was a really useful refresher on the training we attended in 2024.

An introduction to supporting someone facing loss & bereavement

(8th October, Rowcroft Hospice)

The Rowcroft Education team kindly let our work placement student attend this session, which looked at what bereavement and loss are, and how a knowledge of human nature can help us to effectively support people.





Late-stage Parkinson's disease and End-of-Life Care

(18th September, HopeHealth Hospice (in Rhode Island))

It was really interesting to see the similarities and differences in procedures, systems, and protocols between the UK and US!

Unique needs when caring for a veteran

(11th November, HopeHealth Hospice (in Rhode Island))

We proudly support and have supported a number of veterans over the years. This session helped to reinforce some of the considerations we may need to make when supporting veterans in our service.



We love what we do. We're so flattered by the feedback we receive from people we support – our surveys have had glowing feedback in them without exception this year!

Over the course of 2025, we have delivered just over **15,800 hours** of care and support – over 1,400 hours more than in 2024! We've supported 42 people across the year, including the **14 people we welcomed to our service**.

We're also lucky enough to have welcomed **Nikki and Chloe** to our team of Angels. Both are real assets to Teign Angels, and we're so glad they decided to apply for a job with us!

As 2026 rolls around, we're excited for what it'll bring (namely, our 10th anniversary in October!). The world of adult social care is changing, and we are working hard to meet the challenge.

Finally, we gather so many statistics that we have to report to so many bodies and organisations. How many hours of care do we provide a week, rounded to the nearest whole number; how many double-handed visits have we provided between one new moon and the next; what is the average length of everyone's third toe on their right foot, etc. So on the next page, we've gathered some slightly less-serious (i.e. utterly useless but vaguely interesting) statistics. Pudding




Sadly, Pudding became very poorly, and Soph did the last act of love, in preventing her from suffering. Our deepest condolences go to Soph.
